The Maths Magician Numeracy Scheme

Last year, Mirna Peach and Corinne Walker, the Co-Chairs of CoLRiC, celebrated the organisation's 25th anniversary by acknowledging and rewarding best practice in the Further Education and College sector with the presentation of three prestigious library and learning resource centre awards.

'These awards celebrate the very best practice taking place in FE and sixth form college learning resources services. Libraries play a critical role in supporting organisational goals and strategies. Our resources and services have demonstrable value and impact helping create and sustain an institution-wide lifelong learning environment.'


The Library at Northampton was awarded the CoLRiC 2018 Best Practice Award for demonstrating excellent practice in engaging students in numeracy skills. Northampton College's Librarian Amy Harnaman said: 'Maths Magician has raised awareness of the role of the Library as an indispensable service in the promotion of learning. Above all it breaks down the barrier of the general fear of maths in society and makes maths magical, not menacing.'

Innovative interventions

Maths Magician is an original and innovative twenty-week numeracy scheme developed by Library assistants at Northampton College in support of the Government's agenda to improve Literacy and

Numeracy in the UK. The aim of the scheme is to embed numeracy skills by inviting students to continually practise their maths skills through completing a weekly maths puzzle.

A student registers at the Library and receives the first of two Maths Magician work books. Each book contains ten Library related puzzles, incorporating library staff into real life scenarios, for example using the Library cash float. The student collects an information sheet from the Library each week to enable them to complete each puzzle. This information sheet is also displayed online, which produces traffic on the website. Once the puzzle is completed, the student brings the work book into the Library to be checked and stamped by Library staff.



Workshop learning

The scheme is available to all students and is aimed at Entry Level 3/Level 1. Business tutors, Childcare and Health and Social care tutors have all made use of the scheme. Pre-entry ESOL tutors have found Maths Magician to be beneficial in improving their students' understanding of English alongside numeracy skills, finding it an engaging way to mix the two. Furthermore, Maths Magician has been successfully adapted for Level 2 students with a Maths Magician Higher booklet. A weekly maths workshop has also been created to offer structured support to supported learners. It has been so successful that a Maths Magician Plus workbook was produced for use over the summer term.

Positive impact

Maths Magician has had a very positive impact on students. It increases students' confidence with everyday numerical problems, for example, understanding and interpreting time sheets, bills and timetables. Students gain confidence in visiting the Library and interacting with Library staff alongside improving their Literacy skills as the puzzles require careful reading. The scheme has grown in success, 123 students participated during the pilot year (2016) and this number has expanded to 166 participants in the current academic year.

Tutors embrace the scheme as it integrates daily tasks, the questions are practical and relevant and the students like the fact that the questions are linked back to the Library and the Library assistant's everyday real life.

The Maths Magician continues to raise awareness of the role of the Library as an indispensable service in the promotion of learning. Above all it breaks down the barrier of a general fear of maths in society and makes maths magical, not menacing.

Tutor Comments

'I have been using the Maths Magician with my Entry 3 maths group since its launch. At the start I integrated time within my lesson plan to allow the group and I to go as a class to collect the weekly sheets and complete it as I was unsure how the adult students would take to such a scheme. This quickly became unnecessary as I found my students really took to the scheme and most had collected and completed the weekly task prior to their lesson. It has provided a basis of discussion in some lessons, where students have wanted to talk about the week's task as a group, to ensure they understood. As a tutor it has also helped me to see where students have gaps in their knowledge and to show students how maths is integrated into so many tasks we daily perform.'
