# Watch this Space: creating innovative library spaces in an FE college

This article explores how Learning Resource Facilitators in an FE College utilise library spaces to create visual, engaging, digital and interactive displays which ultimately benefit learners

## **Display making 101**

When beginning to change up a learning space within the library, the first question we always ask is "What purpose is this serving?" Often, the answer can be a simple: "Because the students might like it", but the time and effort that go into making innovative learning spaces should usually feed into what is happening around College. At OSFC, we plan our learning spaces around the library's own annual plan - a summary of important dates, weekly themes and college-wide promotions (such as

revision week, careers week and healthy living). This helps us to ensure the displays we're creating have relevance to our students and are related to what they see around the whole of campus every week, giving our library space a purposeful environment.

This doesn't mean every single display we create has to be meaningful in this way. We create "subject of the month" displays to showcase the relevant books and resources we have for subjects, so students may find a useful textbook or revision website for their course. We also promote literacy and reading for pleasure by creating fiction displays in every genre from fantasy, horror and war to our selection of graphic and manga novels. What might appear to be a fun Game of Thrones display serves multiple purposes: it's an interesting, interactive display that students enjoy seeing, and it might even get them to read something new too.



## **Digital displays**

You can utilise digital technologies to make your promotions visually interesting, more engaging for students and easier for them to interact with. For instance, as part of our World Book Night promotion, we had a dozen copies of a previous WBN winner. Instead of simply giving these to students who wanted them, we added a QR code to our display. This code led students to a Google Form, which they had to complete to earn a copy of the book. This was much more engaging and productive than a traditional poster promotion and giveaway; it allowed students to interact with the library space, improve their digital skills, and generated user feedback about a specific product and service we offer. We've also utilised QR codes to promote stock; a short summary about promoted books and a QR code leading to an online book review adds an extra dimension to our fiction section.

If your library has TV screens, these are another great way to use technology to support learning. At OSFC library, we utilise TV screens around the library areas, as well as a touchscreen display at the library reception. Recently, we were inspired by the Twitter trend in libraries called "Bookflix", a Netflix-version of browsing books to binge. We created our own version to promote our stock by displaying titles on the touchscreen with interactive links to our library catalogue. This enabled students to discover new books, something they wouldn't necessarily pick up from a regular bookshelf.



## Take a leaf out of someone else's book

Don't worry if you're not the "techiest" person or don't have a ton of ideas about creating interesting displays or learning spaces. Browsing resources like Twitter and Pinterest can give you lots of ideas for displays, events and competitions that you can try out. Just search for relevant terms on these sites or apps. Also, don't forget other social media sites! Finding other library institutions can be a great source of inspiration and can foster collaboration between libraries. Having your own library accounts on Twitter/Instagram can mean more students see your content too, further increasing engagement between you and your learners. Using these as a springboard for your own library means you can adapt them to suit your learners' needs and interests. If you try something and it doesn't quite work, don't worry! Analyse what worked and what didn't and feed this into future projects. Asking students for their views and comments via Google Forms or a quick paper survey can also garner valuable feedback about your library spaces.



There are lots of ways to make your displays stand out without needing a degree in graphic design! A great website used in our College library is Canva. This site allows you to design posters, cards, presentations, social media banners and more. Canva has loads of free designs for you to customise with text, images, hyperlinks and more, and it's easy to use. You can use it to make a whole host of professional-looking content for displays and library spaces.



These are just a few of the ways library spaces and displays have been implemented to facilitate student learning and engagement. You can get inspiration from this or try something new in your library. You don't always have to do it by the book! #### What do you like to read?

Other favourites include; Game of Thrones, Modern Family, Friends (I am Monica!) and The Big Bang Theory; the latter particularly appealing to my inner nerd/geek and fascination with physics. Cooking and baking (I love GBBO) are important to me, and I aspire to be as good as Mary Berry, but that may take forever. I'm a sucker for a good kitchen gadget.

## What are your pet hates?

Peeling oranges (fiddly, messy, smelly, although glorious taste), white socks with black shoes (fashion crime of the century), cruelty to animals, rudeness/arrogance.

- Choose your battles wisely!




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

#### What do you like to read?

I have always loved reading, despite having a visual impairment. As a child I devoured any books that I could get my hands on, either by borrowing them from the public library or by spending all my pocket money in the local bookshop; much to my parents' amazement!

The arrival of the e-book format has truly changed how I read. No more having to cart around large print tomes or hand-magnifiers for me, reading for me is now truly accessible.

Like most people I do enjoy a bit of crime, the more complicated the better as I like to be challenged. One of my favourite authors is Ann Cleeves, since I was lucky enough to work with her when she was the Reading Development Officer for Kirklees Libraries.

Historical mysteries are also a favourite as I often find that they make me want to find out more about the period in which they are set. ## What do you like to watch?

To be honest my viewing habits are a bit eclectic! I am a real sucker for a US crime series, especially the psychological ones which make you concentrate, such as Elementary (and am currently hooked on Perception).

I've recently subscribed to Amazon Prime, which has enabled me to finally get to watch the whole three series of Versailles as well as The Man in the High Castle (based on the Phillip K Dick books).

Having spent the past five years working on our house, I love watching anything to do with home renovation / restoration, such as Grand Designs, The Restoration Man, Salvage Hunters and the Repair Shop to name a few.

My guilty pleasure is watching Neighbours and getting to discuss the latest ludicrous plotlines with two of my colleagues who also watch the show (much to the amusement of the rest of the team!)
